ENGAGING STUDENTS BEYOND THE CLASSROOM



Clubs and organizations at Middlesex College help students stay connected and engaged, providing another key piece of their educational puzzle.

"Because we have such a diverse group of students at Middlesex College, we see our wide array of clubs as an important part of student life to bring our campus together," said Odé Hoppie, Assistant Dean for Student Engagement.

Middlesex College has approximately 45 student organizations open to all of the nearly 10,000 enrolled students. They are broken down into six main categories: honor societies, academic-based clubs, affinity-based clubs, special interest clubs, mediabased clubs and athletic clubs.

Each club has a faculty or staff advisor who works closely with the Student Life Office to maintain successful and engaging programming.

Students are also encouraged to start a club if they see a need or interest that is not already represented. Hoppie said that the threshold is seven members and a club constitution and that the Student Life staff can assist students with drafting the constitution and recruiting members.



The big day for all of the clubs on campus is the Student Engagement Fair at the start of every semester. This is where students can learn about the individual clubs on campus, meet representatives and find out what being involved in the club entails.

"Clubs are a great way to take advantage of what Middlesex College has to offer, but also are an important part of the overall college experience," Hoppie said.

"It's a chance for students to apply what they have learned in the classroom and expand on that in a new environment, make connections with other students who have a shared interest or background, or learn new skills or leadership skills as a club officer."

Hoppie said the Office of Student Life, located in College Center, is always open to students who want to find out more about the College's wide array of clubs and organizations.

"There are also social events, parties, speakers, free giveaways, and sometimes food," said Hoppie with a laugh. "It can be a great opportunity to meet people you'd never have encountered before."

GIVING DAY TUESDAY


