Join CELT for our September Technology and SOTL Sessions.

Thursday, September 17 at 2 p.m. Using Perusall to Create a Social Presence and Invigorate Learning Crystal Quillen

Social reading or note-sharing has recently become popular amongst the undergraduate population, so much so, that software has been created to help students learn in a more practical way. Programs such as PIVOT, Diigo, and Perusall have been shown to not only enhance student preparation and learning, but also increase a sense of community within the classroom. Using outcomes from Psychology as an example, we'll discuss the benefits of Perusall and how to implement it in your course whether your students are meeting face-to-face, online, or remote live.

Tuesday, September 22 at 2 p.m. Building Community Online: Ideas to Engage and Retain Students Celia Winchester

When educators teach online, they sometimes can feel disconnected from their students. Research shows that when online students feel connected to their instructor and class, they are less likely to engage in attrition. This presentation will demonstrate several methods and tools which you can utilize to create community and rapport with your students.

Ideas for Pedagogy for the Start of the Semester

Create a sense of community in your Zoom Classroom You may want to consider opening your Zoom classroom 10-15 minutes before the start of your class to chat, build a sense of community, and get to know your students in a more informal way. You can also stay a few minutes after class to answer questions and create connections with your students.

Use an Icebreaker on the first day of class Icebreakers help your students feel part of the community and be comfortable in your classroom. Many traditional icebreakers can be transferred to remote learning by using breakout rooms, the chat feature and polling. Breakout rooms and polling can be added to your account in Zoom Settings.

Think of multiple ways to present information Research shows that students learn in many different ways. Consider presenting content using multiple modalities to engage all of your students.

Universal Design and Accessibility Universal Design helps all learners and should be a priority in your class. Posting a narrated PowerPoint in Canvas Studio? Please add captioning to your videos. Studio will caption your narration, but you will need to edit it for accuracy. You should also add Alt-text to your Canvas images so they can be read by Screenreaders. More Pedagogy to Engage Remote Learners in your Class

Two-Minute Break Caitlin Bergendahl and Tiffany Freitas from Virginia Commonwealth University recommend incorporating a **Two-Minute Break**. During a **Two-Minute Break**, students write down one thing to let go of, one thing they are grateful for, and three things they will focus on that day. This helps students establish clear goals and accomplish them.

Muddiest Point The "Muddiest Point" help you assess where students are having difficulties. Using the chat feature, ask students to write down the point that is still most confusing to them (it can be private). You can also use *Polls* in Zoom to ask a question to assess their understanding.

Audio Feedback Research shows that timely and targeted feedback is important to support learners in an online class. A useful feature of Canvas Gradebook is the ability to leave audio feedback for your students on their assignments. Students respond to hearing your comments and will often comment back!
