New Ideas/New Pedagogy

Beginning of the semester surveys: In addition to introducing yourself on Canvas (I am making a video to introduce myself), you may want to consider creating a start of the semester survey in Canvas to help you learn more about your students. A survey can help you learn about their access to technology, preferred pronouns, prior knowledge and any other questions you may want to know about your students. How (and Why!) to Write a Pre-Course Survey or Questionnaire may give you some ideas for questions.

Once the semester begins, you can do another survey called, <u>Start, Stop, Continue</u>. This technique allows students to let you know what you can start doing, stop doing, and continue doing to support their learning.

Difficult Discussions in the Classroom: As educators, we want to create spaces for meaningful and productive discussions in our remote classrooms, especially when discussing difficult or controversial topics. While these conversations may not always be relevant to our specific disciplines, here are some resources in case conversations come up in your classroom. *Facing History*, offers <u>Fostering Civil Discourse</u>: <u>How Do We Talk About issues that Matter</u> as a free PDF download upon registering. Vanderbilt University's *Center for Teaching* suggests thinking about how difficult topics connect with your subject area and using intentional strategies to help students deal with, and learn from difficult dialogues. In their article, <u>Difficult Dialogues</u>, they offer specific tools and strategies for managing difficult conversations in the classroom. *Difficult Dialogues National Resource Center* offers some <u>Strategies</u> for Current Challenges for Dialogue Facilitation.
