### **New Ideas/New Pedagogy**

How can we re-energize student learning at midterm? As we head into midterm, students often hit the midterm slump. This is a good time to revisit the midsemester survey. The Scholarly Teacher recommends using midsemester feedback to help you identify instructional approaches that best meet student preferences for learning. This is especially important with remote live or online teaching. What is working for your students? What do they need to help them succeed? Tip: Midterm Feedback reminds us that we want to ask for feedback that we can realistically implement. Focusing on actionable feedback makes the experience better for our students and they feel that their ideas are heard and respected.

The Center for Research in Learning and Teaching at the University of Michigan, recommends Enhancing Student Learning: Seven Principles for Good Practice. Good practice encourages student - instructor contact to help students stay motivated and involved in their courses. Reaching out to struggling students can make a difference.

**Student Check-ins:** Another way to help motivate students and build community is to create a class check in. As you wait for class to begin, you can post a "How are you feeling?" meme or ask a question in the chat and have everyone press enter/return at the same time. Each week in during the fall semester, students in my courses shared something good that happened that week, even if it was pizza for dinner. Students were happy to share their "good" news and this weekly conversation helped build community and make connections between students.

Ideas into Practice: In his book, *Radical Hope: A Teaching Manifesto*, Dr. Kevin Gannon recommends keeping a time journal to help you to evaluate how much time you spend on each task in your class. As you look at the results of your journal, ask yourself: How much time do you spend on teacher-centered methods (for example, lecturing) and how much time do you spend using student centered methods of instruction such as discussion, peer instruction and group work? What do you observe in your teaching and do these activities align with your broader pedagogical philosophy? Does your record match with your intentions? Once you have reflected on these activities, consider some of the ways you can change your teaching to be more student centered and add more active learning to your classroom.
