

New Ideas/New Pedagogy

Office Hour Ideas: How are you handling your office hours this semester? While it seems like a lot of extra work, Zachary Nowak, Lecturer at Harvard and Boston University makes a compelling argument for asking all students to come to required office hours. In his article, Why I require Office Hours Visits, he also explains his reasoning and how he adds a module in Canvas describing "what to expect" in office hours. Many students have no idea about the purpose of office hours or why they are important. Students have multiple responsibilities, and virtual office hours are more accessible for many of them. The Learning Center at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill has advice for students Using Office Hours Effectively, which you may want to share with your students, including preparing questions in advance of the meeting. Even students understand the importance of office hours. The Daily Californian, the student run newspaper of UC Berkeley, posted advice to their fellow students, Why you should always go to your professor's office hours.

Starting the Semester: Icebreakers: What do you do to build community in your classes? Many of the traditional icebreakers can be implemented in your online or zoom classroom. I like to start off with a "get to know you question" in each of my zoom classes. Sometimes we talk about our favorite pizza, or a fun thing we did each week. Use the "waterfall technique" where everyone posts to the chat but doesn't hit enter until you say "go." Using this technique allows everyone to comment without influence from their peers. This technique works for content questions as well, and is an excellent way to engage students during your class. The Poorvu Center at Yale University has some additional ideas for Engaging Students Through Zoom. What engagement techniques have you found helpful in your classroom?
