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CELT Teaching Corner



Nadine Thompson Instructor, Dental Hygiene

How many years have you taught? I have been teaching for 8 years; 7 as an adjunct at Middlesex and then became full time in January 2021.

What classes do you teach? I teach Dental Health Education, Community Dental Health, and am a clinical instructor for Preventative Oral Health Services for the second-year dental hygiene students in clinic and radiology.

What about teaching do you find most enjoyable? I really love it when the students have that "light-bulb" moment and they are making connections outside of their didactic courses *Three words that best describe your teaching style*. and seeing the bigger picture while treating their patients in clinic. As this is a health professional program, I get to see the students' growth and development over two years and there's nothing better than seeing a student reach their goal of graduation and pass their licensure exams.

Briefly describe a favorite assignment or in-class activity. One of my favorite assignments uses an online simulation activity that highlights the drastic health and social disparities that exist in our communities. It poses different life scenarios to the students and they have to make decisions regarding their jobs, healthcare, childcare, housing, transportation etc.; each decision has different outcomes and they see how much their finances play a role in the options they actually have available. After the simulation exercise, they have to answer questions as it relates to community oral health and make connections from the lecture material.

What is something your students/colleagues would be surprised to learn about you? I got married at 18 years old, and thankfully, 22 years later I have no regrets! I am not an adventurous person by nature, but since our family has two growing boys, 9 & 11, my husband is constantly creating new adventures for us to do. Just in the last 3 years, I have tried surfing (broke a toe), climbed a mountain in CO (survived), went outdoor rock climbing, kayaked some pretty strong currents, and was a passenger in a "rock crawler" up and down sheer vertical rocks (Moab, UT).



Clairie Vassiliadis

Professor, Mathematics

How many years have you taught? I've been teaching full-time since the fall of 1999. Prior to that, I taught as an adjunct at Rutgers, Newark and NJIT for about 5 years.

What classes do you teach? I teach in the Mathematics Department. I usually teach courses in the Calculus sequence like Algebra, Precalculus, Calculus I and II, but I have also taught other classes like Statistics I and II, Mathematical Structures I and II, Mathematics of Money and A Survey of Mathematics.

Passionate. Positive. Student-centered.

Briefly tell us about your favorite lecture topic or course to teach. My favorite ever activity, and I am admitting that I haven't done it for a while, is what you would call "Let the students lead the class".

At the beginning of the semester, I ask students to choose a topic/section, from the syllabus, that they will have to present and introduce to the class for about 20 minutes. I then ask them to give an introduction of the selected topic and solve a couple of examples. This requires preparation and deep understanding of the material, not only for the current topic, but also of any previous topics.

My goal is to get students excited to show their knowledge, share it with their classmates, speak the language of math and write on the board using the correct terminology and mathematical notation. Through this process of preparing to teach a topic to their classmates, students come to my office hours for help and guidance and that results in a comfortable and supportive relationship.

What is something your students/colleagues would be surprised to learn about you? To my colleague-friends, I am like an open book... But something I don't really share much them with, is that I was a student-athlete, played varsity volleyball at NJIT, and I was Most Valuable Player (MVP) for 2 years in a row!

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
