New Ideas/New Pedagogy

Thinking about your Spring syllabi: In October, we had a lively session on *Deconstructing the Syllabus* with Giuseppe Rotolo. Everyone left with new ideas on how to change their syllabi and have a better understanding of what is the most important things for students to know. In the spring, we are continuing the syllabus discussion with a session on a *Liquid Syllabus* with Crystal Quillen. Interested in learning more about how to shake up your syllabus for spring? Read about the liquid syllabus, and come to our session in January to really learn how to create one! North Carolina State University talks about <u>Liquid Syllabus</u>: <u>Going with the Flow</u> as a way to support students.

What other ways can you use your syllabus to create a more learner centered and equity minded classroom?

Grading: As we head into the busy period of finals and even busier period of grading, you may want to read up on some new approaches to make this task easier. Rethinking our Relationship with Grading: An Invitation to Reflect and Make Time gives some tips to help you manage your grading, including carving out dedicated time just to grade. In 10 Grading Tips for Teachers, there are strategies to provide feedback without becoming overwhelmed.
