New Ideas/New Pedagogy

AI: A Continuing Conversation: Al still continues to be a conversation in all areas of Higher Education. CELT hopes you will join us in the Spring for our Tech Thursdays which will focus on learning more about Al and how to use it in the classroom. The metaLAB (at) Harvard shares assignments in the <u>AI Pedagogy Project</u>.

Grading: Thank you to everyone who joined us for a lively discussion on grading and for sharing of the many different ways we approach assessment in our classrooms. As we work on our syllabi for the spring, it is a good time to reflect on how we grade and consider new ideas. In *Inside HigherEd*, <u>Yes Virginia</u>, <u>There's a Better Way to Grade</u>, Linda B. Nilson offers concrete ideas on how to fix the grading system by using specifications grading. A new book by Jack Schneider and Ethan Hutt, both Professors of Education, talks about <u>How Grading Veered 'off the Mark'</u> and what we can do about it. *The Center for Transformative Teaching* at the University of Nebraska talks about <u>Alternative Grading for College Courses</u> and <u>Contract Grading</u> as ideas to explore. <u>Beyond the "Grade": Alternative Approaches to Assessment</u> offers additional ideas to consider moving forward.

Difficult Moments in the Classroom: In these difficult times, we all have had difficult discussions come up in the classroom and we may be unsure on how to deal with them. How you address these conversations can make a difference in how our students learn. CELT will be having a session on trauma-informed teaching in the spring, and we offer some ideas in advance of that session. Harvard's *Derek Bok Center for Teaching and Learning* suggests how to Navigate Difficult Moments. The Resilient Educator has Essential Trauma Informed Teaching Strategies for Managing Stress in the Classroom (and Virtual Classrooms). The University of Oregon offers a Teaching in Turbulent Times Toolkit which may help you facilitate difficult discussions in a safe and supportive space for our students. Teaching in Context: Troubling Times and Teaching in Times of Crisis both offer ideas for handling these difficult discussions.
