Let's dish! Join us for this month's pedagogy potluck on **Assessment**. Discuss your repertoire of strategies for assessment with peers across the disciplines as we share and reflect on new pedagogical approaches and discover how these strategies would work in your own classroom. Bring an open mind to the potluck and leave with a dish full of new ideas!

New Ideas/ New Pedagogy

Al in Higher Education: The conversation about Al in Higher Ed is continuing as well as constantly changing. Are you allowing students to use Al in your classes? Whatever you decide, it is important to make your expectations clear in your syllabus. Are students allowed to use Chat GPT and under what parameters? Is it for all assignments or only selected assignments? In an article from *Inside Higher Ed*, <u>Struggling to Create Al Policies? Ask Your Students</u> a Professor at Florida International University finds that her students are stricter with their policies than she would have been. In the article, <u>Developing Your Approach to Generative AI</u>, the authors offer a series of guiding questions to help you navigate a response for use in your classroom. The Derek Bok Center at Harvard University suggests <u>Taking an Informed Approach</u> to Al policies in the classroom. How can CELT help you with Al in your classroom? During the last academic year, we met to experiment with the different types of Al available and how to use it effectively. Please let us know what sort of programming would be helpful to you so we can plan for Al sessions for Spring.

Reflection at Midterm: As we move into midterm (midterm grading starts October 17) how can we help our students continue to be successful until the end of the semester? In the article, <u>Feedback: Maximizing Its Impact</u>, the author gives suggestions on how to embrace feedback as transformative for student achievement. One way to assess how students are doing at midterm is to give a low-stakes midterm evaluation to see how students are doing in your class. In the article from *Inside Higher Ed*, <u>Mid-Semester Evaluations</u>, the author suggests the "Stop – Start – Continue" technique. Ask your students for one thing that they would like to stop doing in class, two things that they would like you to start doing in class, and three things they want you to continue in class. While you may not be able to use all of their suggestions, for example to stop giving exams, research shows that asking your students helps you to evaluate how the class is going for your students, and allows them to be reflective on their own learning. You may also get some great suggestions!

Midterm is also a good time to shake up your teaching with new pedagogical approaches. Join us on October 10 to learn how to use Kahoot! which is now integrated into Canvas. You can also try other polling technology such as using Mentimeter, Poll Everywhere, or Slido. All of these polling techniques help to engage students and get them involved in your class. Have you tried the <u>ripple</u> technique? Have each student respond individually to a prompt (in their head or on paper) and then share their responses with three peers before opening it up to volunteers to share with the entire class. Asking for a volunteer before calling on students helps to get the conversation started without the silence that often happens in the classroom. Once a volunteer speaks, then you can call on others in the class.
