New Ideas/New Pedagogy

Student Engagement:

At our CELT Mentoring sessions, we have been sharing ideas on successful engagement strategies that we have been using with our students. What strategies can we use to keep students engaged after midterms? In the article, <u>Recovering Student</u> <u>Engagement at Mid-Course Time</u>, Professor Anna Conway from Des Moines Area Community College periodically adds low stakes active learning strategies instead of direct lecturing. She also does a mid-semester survey to help her reflect on her teaching, change strategies, and motivate students. The University of Pittsburgh offers several ideas for <u>Engagement Best</u> <u>Practices</u> that can be used throughout the semester, including ones specific to lab courses. The Poll Everywhere Blog has a list of <u>19 Engagement Activities to Make Learning Fun for Students</u>. Speaking of Poll Everywhere, be sure to watch for our *Tech Tips and Tricks* sessions in the Spring to learn how to effectively use polling to engage students in your classes and share your own engagement strategies. Another way to engage students is to update your presentations. In <u>Your PowerPoints Probably</u> <u>Suck</u>, (that is the real title) from *Inside Higher Ed*, Zachary Nowak gives 10 suggestions on how to improve your presentations. CELT will be sharing new PowerPoint strategies in the spring semester to make your classes and your presentations more engaging to your students. Another way to engage your students is the encourage them in their success. <u>Full Disclosure of the</u> <u>Terms of Success: Nine Things to Tell Your Students</u> gives suggestions for things to tell your students to encourage their success.

AI in Higher Ed:

Are you using AI for assignments? How are you using it with your classes? Please join our tech sessions in the spring to share how you are using AI. *Educause* posted an AI Landscape Survey, <u>The Future of AI in Higher Education</u> with appropriate and inappropriate uses of AI in the classroom. We know there is a lot to think about on how and why you want to use it. Whatever decision that you make, be sure to clearly state your policies in your syllabus so students know what you expect. *The Scholarly Teacher* suggests a framework for developing your approach in <u>Developing Your Approach to Generative AI</u>.

Online Teaching:

Teaching an online class? In <u>Connecting with Online Students</u> from *Faculty Focus*, the authors emphasize the importance of connecting with your students and offer strategies to increase engagement. In the article, <u>Fostering Connectedness in</u> <u>the Asynchronous Online Environment</u>, the authors discuss methods of course design to help enhance connections including strategies for the message board as a way to help students connect with the material and each other.

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
