DISCOVERING YOUR PASSION

SHANICE PEARSON was a Criminal Justice major at Middlesex College and has transferred to Rider University to continue her studies. She plans to become a juvenile probation officer.

At Middlesex College, she was active in Democracy House, the center for civic engagement on campus, taking part in collecting donations for local nonprofit organizations, including Central Jersey Diaper Bank, Toys for Tots and Jersey Book Pickup.

She was also a member of the Phi Theta Kappa international honor society and the secretary of the Juvenile Justice Reform Club, where she worked with residents in the Middlesex County Juvenile Detention Center. It was her experience with residents at the Detention Center that led Shanice to choose juvenile probation as a career path.

"Being there completely changed my attitude about the juvenile justice system and juveniles overall. These kids need a voice, someone to fight for them, someone to lean on for support and someone to lead them away from where they are now. Most of these kids do not have that."

The fullness of her college experience would not have been possible had she not availed herself of the varied campus opportunities open to her, she says.

"It was only after I decided to get involved in clubs and activities that things really changed for me. I did so much in my two years at Middlesex College, things that I continue to do, such as volunteering with nonprofit organizations and hosting workshops for teens."

HER ADVICE: "Take advantage of every opportunity presented to you when you're here. My biggest regret is not getting involved sooner because once I did, everything clicked. Right now, I feel like the opportunity is so unlimited for me. And I don't think that would have been the case if I had attended any other college."





THE ROAD TO FINANCIAL FREEDOM

GISELLE VIDALS majored in Allied Health Pre-Professional at Middlesex College and has now transferred to William Paterson University where she is working toward a bachelor of science in nursing. She plans on working as a travel nurse, specializing in critical care nursing.

"Going to Middlesex College was honestly the best decision. Doing well there, along with the help of financial aid advisors, helped me get a lot of scholarships," she explained.

At Middlesex College, Giselle was a member of Phi Theta Kappa honor society. The absence of financial anxiety, she says, allowed her to focus on and excel in her classes.

"Now I'm on track to graduate debt free and be able to focus on my academics for the next two years of my life," she revealed.

At Middlesex College, Giselle took on a leadership role when she became co-president of Phi Theta Kappa. In that position, she initiated care package drives to collect essential items that were often overlooked by donors.

The "Warm Their Soles" donation drive she started collected over 1,000 pairs of new socks for Catholic Charities, Diocese of Metuchen, and its shelters. She also led a donation drive to collect menstrual products for domestic abuse survivors and formerly incarcerated individuals re-entering society.

"Knowing that this was going toward helping people taught me how everyone can make a difference."

Her time at Middlesex College also helped her break out of her shell and engage more with the community around her.

"In high school I was a bit shy. Being at Middlesex College, especially taking up a leadership position, really helped my confidence. I was able to express myself more, meet new people and really put myself out there," she shared.

HER ADVICE: "Get involved. The world will never stop needing compassion and kindness, and I plan to always spread it wherever I can."

POSITIONED FOR SUCCESS

ZULGARNAIN FAYYAZ double majored in engineering science and earth science and has now transferred to Georgia Tech, where he is pursuing a bachelor's degree in chemical and biomolecular engineering. In addition to Georgia Tech, Zulqarnain was accepted at Columbia University and New York University, and was waitlisted at MIT.

"I decided on Georgia Tech because it is a top engineering school, and they have a strong professional network with alumni working at NASA and big energy companies like ExxonMobil and Saudi Aramco."

Since moving to the U.S. from Pakistan in 2019, Zulqarnain has approached his education and career methodically.

"Middlesex College was always my first choice. Many of my relatives also graduated from there and recommended it highly."

That decision, he says, paid off.

"The classes at Middlesex College are rigorous. They are as competitive as any of the four-year programs found within the state."

He credits class size and faculty who go above and beyond the curriculum in helping their students navigate their first collegiate experience, as they transition to the next.

"Classes are relatively small which means professors can give students individual time. They can identify the areas that you're weak in and help you out with that. In addition to teaching the subject matter, my professors taught me how to study, advised me on careers and guided me during my search for four-year engineering programs."

Among his campus activities, Zulqarnain was secretary of the STEM Club and founded the Pakistani Student Association, serving as its president.

HIS ADVICE: "Go to Middlesex College before going to a four-year program straightaway from high school. Get a college experience, take the classes and transfer. All the classes I took were transferable. It saved a lot of money, and you'll be in a stronger position to succeed once you transfer."





NEW PATHWAY TO KAMI

STOCKTON UNIVERSITY

A new dual admission and transfer agreement with Stockton University will provide multiple opportunities for students looking to pursue both an associate and a bachelor's degree.

The program affords students access to Stockton University services, including campus housing, academic advising and student activities, while attending Middlesex College.

KEAN UNIVERSITY

The College also signed a new agreement with Kean University – Pathway to Kean – to provide students with access to an affordable pathway for earning a bachelor's degree.

SERVING THE COMMUNITY

As COVID-19 continues to impact the most vulnerable, the College community stepped up its efforts to collect food donations, as well as essential items such as diapers for various organizations.


The Middlesex College community also rallied around promoting the vote to students and others through numerous activities prior to the 2020 election.



WORKING TOWARD GREATER DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION

The Middlesex College Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Advisory Council held its first meeting, marking the launch of the College's new DEI initiative. The Council will serve as an advisory body on ways to develop and foster an atmosphere on campus for the inclusion and appreciation of all members of the College community and to offer ideas on how to create and sustain a culture of equity and inclusive excellence in four main areas:

WORKING WITH INDUSTRY PARTNERS

The College's Career Training Center partnered with three area businesses (Affinity Federal Credit Union, Unitex, and Packaging Distribution Resources) in equipping young adults with employability skills, exposing them to careers, and helping them to learn to work as a team through work experiences.

The College was awarded a U.S. Department of Labor grant for developing apprenticeships in advanced manufacturing, including a Pre-Apprenticeship Boot Camp for students interested in learning about the manufacturing industry.

Grant-funded Continuing Education staff are developing a registered apprenticeship program that will enable Middlesex County residents to begin a career with regional manufacturing employers.




PUBLISHED AUTHORS



DONORS PAVED THE WAY FOR STUDENTS TO EXPLORE, GROW AND **THRIVE**

In 2020-2021, student need for financial assistance and scholarship support, combined with a dramatically increased need for both basic and emergency assistance, presented a huge challenge for the Middlesex College Foundation.

The Foundation was able to respond to the urgency of the moment thanks to the support of so many generous and committed donors.



MEETING THE NEEDS OF THE WHOLE STUDENT

Personal financial hardships, including food and housing insecurity, unreliable transportation, and limited educational resources and technology, can be imposing barriers in making education a priority. Students **THRIVE** only when those barriers are addressed.

Over the last year, 112 donors gave 226 gifts totaling \$53,541 in support of the College's goal to meet basic needs and provide emergency funds. Gifts ranging from \$5 to \$20,000 helped support the College's Food Pantry and Student Emergency Fund, critical resources for our students during an unprecedented time of need.

PROGRAM AND GRANT SUPPORT

Our corporate and foundation partners recognize that student dreams are as diverse as their backgrounds, interests and abilities.

Donors who support programs provide opportunities for students to **GROW** through high quality, challenging curriculums, and innovative and specialized programs.



SHARING OUR VALUES

The Rutgers Community Health Foundation (RCHF) strengthened its ongoing commitment to Middlesex College students.

In 2020-2021, the RCHF supplied a basic needs emergency grant to support New Brunswick students enrolled at the College by providing COVID-19-related assistance through grant funds that were used to help students with rental aid, utility payments and food vouchers.

Additionally, the RCHF provided an \$85,000 grant to help adult learners in New Brunswick explore and prepare to enter the healthcare field, including creating Pathways into Health Careers Bootcamps.

PROVIDING ACCESS TO OPPORTUNITY

In 2020-2021, 373 students received scholarship awards totaling \$642,468. Donors who support scholarships give for many reasons, but all have the same result. Scholarships provide access to education, allowing students to **EXPLORE** diverse educational paths with a goal of finding their passion and ultimately a career.

New scholarship donors include:

- Aldo Villarreal '16, a first-generation college student who wanted to give back for the opportunity he was afforded, established a scholarship for undocumented students.
- Karen Carey '90 funded a scholarship for students pursuing careers that serve others in memory of her son David, a Middlesex College student at the time of his passing.
- Dottie David-Wilson established an endowed nursing scholarship in memory of her late husband Michael, former executive director of the College Foundation, who was committed to education.

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
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

Middlesex College's total operating budget for Fiscal Year 2019-2020 was \$78,419,761




Fiscal Year 2019-2020 College Revenue



Fiscal Year 2019-2020 College Expenditures

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
